The ripples have gone out over those years – to 4 million members in 84 countries, changing families and communities. One woman in one parish began it all. One small boy had a picnic – but in the hands of Jesus, it fed a multitude, with 12 baskets of left-overs - nothing was wasted! In His hands, every small offering of service and prayer from each of us is used and multiplied, and nothing is wasted.

Tuesday – the overwhelm

'Philip answered, 'Two hundred silver pieces wouldn't be enough to buy bread for each person to get a piece.' John 6:7 In Mark *'That would take more than half a year's wages! Are WE to go and spend that much on bread and give it to them to eat?'*

Father God – the size of the problems facing the world, facing our lands, facing our communities and even facing our families and ourselves...they're just overwhelming. We feel paralysed by the enormity of the needs and concerns. As the disciples reacted with 'it's not possible' – 'it's not practical' – and even a feeling of 'that just wouldn't be fair – you couldn't ask that of us!' – so do we react. Forgive us, dear Lord.

We pray that we would be changed by the Holy Spirit – to become more like Jesus as we respond to the needs, close to home and across the world.

Wednesday – the small offering

'One of the disciples – it was Andrew, brother to Simon Peter – said, 'There's a little boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But that's a drop in the bucket for a crowd like this.' John 6:8-9

Dear Lord, how that little boy might have felt that day: embarrassed to be singled out in front of everyone, ready to be mocked for such a small offering; or eager to simply give what he had, somehow understanding that this man could do something wonderful with it?

We often feel that anything we have to offer is too small or will be ineffectual – an invisible drop in a huge bucket. But offered over into your hands, every action, word or prayer will be

used by you and useful to you. Forgive our lack of courage and faith, dear Lord.

We pray for ourselves and all those who follow you to grasp the importance of our words, deeds and prayers.

Thursday – obedience and blessing

‘Jesus said, ‘Make the people sit down.’ There was a nice carpet of green grass in this place. They sat down, about five thousand of them. Then Jesus took the bread and, having given thanks, gave it to those who were seated. He did the same with the fish. All ate as much as they wanted.’ John 6:10-11

Luke and Matthew say there were 5,000 men – Matthew adds, ‘besides women and children’ – this was a massive crowd of hungry people who had followed Jesus to hear him speak.

Almighty God, in this account – so familiar and still so amazing – we see your power in your Son. The people settled and sat. Jesus looked to you and then broke the small loaves and divided the little fish. The disciples obeyed and played their part – distributing the food to the people. And every person had their needs met – they ‘all ate as much as they wanted’.

We pray so often, as he taught us, ‘give us today our daily bread’, and we thank you, Lord.
